Dear Members

Suddenly, we are counting down the days until Christmas and the New Year. 2023 has been an amazing year of firsts and best-evers filled with learning and discovery for the team, Committees, and a new GM. Commodore Dr Janet Hornbuckle as our first female Commodore, first Female Life Member in Pamela Strickland, first (of more to follow) Sustainability Award from Australian Sailing, The Youth Match Racing Championships, Gold in the **RS Venture Connect World** Championships in Rostocker, Germany by Genevieve Wickham and the Blind Sailing Team most recently competing in the U.K. Not to mention some successful 'best ever' events like our 159th Sailing Season Opening Day, and the 40th Anniversary of Australia II's America's Cup Victory.

It's been very pleasing to see our team respond to achieving higher levels of service. The One Club One Team mantra along with realising the little things are important has translated into a harmonious, engaged team. As always, if you have feedback, an idea or suggestion, see something that needs repair or is a safety hazard, please don't delay in speaking up so we can continue to constantly improve.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

Capital projects are classified in two ways; aspirational (like to do's) and obligational (must do). We are undertaking a 10-year capital asset repair and replacement review, for all the Club's \$20M worth of Assets. As you well know the marine environment is particularly brutal and our Crawley Clubhouse needs a refurbishment. In consultation and collaboration with the General Committee, these projects have been approved as immediate priorities in 2023/2024:

 Southerly Crawley Car Park resurfacing and line marking. (Obligational) Cost is approximately \$95k. To be completed over 3-4 days in early- mid January 2024.

Multiple trip hazards, poor access for wheelchairs, poor aesthetic presentation. Does not include the easterly gravel / pond area due to asbestos buried beneath and sub drainage works being excessive.

 Northstar Software. (Obligational) Membership, Accounting Software, new website, and new Point of sale. Cost approximately \$163K.

Implementation begins April 2024 and go live 1 June 2024.

Old systems at end of life, website not functional, improved experience for Members and data extraction capabilities for management & committees.

 Boat Lifter Walk out Fingers (Obligational) Cost is \$27K. Commencing 18 December for 10 days.

Concrete cancer is in need of attention and repair.

4. Fremantle Annexe Anodes (Obligational)
Cost \$56k
Completed November 2023
Cathartic protection for the Marina infrastructure.

MEMBERSHIP

Membership remains steady. Our 4-week free trial Membership has been well received. We are now focused on recruitment and induction with the newly formed Membership Committee (see table below).

FINANCES

The strong upward trend continues thanks to improved governance, partnership with Committees, Member patronage (thank you!) over 20K of covers since June 1, increased functions and events, active cost control, budgeting, and cost recoveries. As at 31 October, after depreciation of \$561K, we recorded a Net Profit of \$18k which is an improvement of \$215K from last year.

Cash at bank is over \$800K meaning we have been able to use surplus funds for Capital Projects, interest, and debt reduction.

So lets take a look back at the 2023 Time Trialling season.

We had 12 boats nominate for the season with an average of 8 boats completing at each event, including our 2 newcomers, *Corinne Adele* and *Meeka*. We soon learned that they were ones to watch.

Six different competitors featured in the top three places for championship over the 9 events.

Governor's Cup 2023



Mercedes and her winning team

On Saturday 11th November, 65 boats started in the Governor's Cup on a gusty south easterly from Royal Perth Yacht Club.

Being a handicap start, Matilda Bay was filled with yachts of all classes and sizes as they anticipated the fall of their number. They jostled for position with fellow starters, and as per usual, a couple were confused by the definition of fall ("Boats shall start at or after the FALL (when their number disappears)") and commenced racing in the minute before.

As the numbers ticked down, boats headed out to the first mark in small groups, until only the few were left. The last few starters had plenty of space and time to get a good run at the line and by 1430 all were on their way to Royal Fresh Water Bay Yacht Club, pursuing the yachts already on course. Just days before her 110th birthday, Mercedes started at the fall of 59 and glided through the waves, her gaff rigged main perfectly harnessing the breeze. She took just over an hour and forty six minutes to traverse the 9.2 nautical mile course and lead the fleet into Freshwater Bay. As one of the oldest boats on the Royal Perth Yacht Club Register, Mercedes is not unfamiliar with winning the Governor's Cup, notably under her original owner and Life Member the Late Horace Rumble. Congratulations to skipper Kane Williamson, and crew Gary Smith, Joanne Spence, Junior Member Orlando Ligovich and his father Peter for their welldeserved win adding to the legacy of this classic wooden boat. ■

What a night it was!

What a fabulous finale to the 40th anniversary celebrations of a truly historic day.

On the 26th of September 1983 in Newport, Rhode Island, Royal Perth Yacht Club's challenger for the America's Cup, *Australia II*, achieved the seemingly impossible when her intrepid skipper (John Bertrand) and determined crew won the critically important, utterly exhausting, final race that wrested the coveted America's Cup away from the New York Yacht Club after 132 years. Australia II broke the longest winning streak in sporting history!

Many *Australia II* Team anniversaries, special events and reunions have been held in conjunction with Royal Perth Yacht Club since 1983, but none has been quite as wonderful, or quite as poignant, as that held on the evening of our 40th anniversary on the same date in 2023.

Sadly, we have lost nine of the 36 Team members over the years. Some were key to our success; others were highly valued for their specialist skills. All are greatly missed. Still, the remaining members in WA, in the east and overseas were keen to have a 40th

anniversary reunion in Perth-Fremantle and keen to share stories and lessons learned, not only with those old enough to remember but to inspire younger generations.

400 people, in the presence of the Governor of Western Australia, His Excellency The Hon. Chris Dawson and the WA Minister for Sport, Recreation and Culture, The Hon. David Templeman MLA, proved a triumphant and very meaningful conclusion to weeks of publicity and special events -- public and private – for members of the Australia II Team.

Immediately prior to the Gala Dinner, RPYC honoured the Team and their partners by transporting them on board three vessels, escorted by a flotilla of yachts, up the beautiful Swan River from the Fremantle Annexe of the Club to the Crawley headquarters close to sunset.

The three boats carrying Team members, yacht club officials and staff led by Commodore, Dr Janet Hornbuckle were *Black Swan*, the former tender for *Australia II* at Newport, now owned by Steve Wall, *Bon Voyage* (John and Deb Allpike) and *Silver Mist* (Peter and Emma Milner).

Australia II Team member, Skip Lissiman, who travelled with other Team members on *Black Swan*, said the trip brought back a lot of memories for those who knew her so well from Newport and from the Cup Defence in Fremantle in 1987.

"Steve was a fantastic host and we regaled him – and others on board -- with memories and stories involving this much-loved boat in earlier days," Skip said. "The trip up the river was very special, very reflective but also a relaxing and joyful way for Team members and Club members to share memories of people and events so important to us all."

According to fellow Team member, John Longley, another highlight of the trip for Team members was to arrive at the Crawley docks with a direct line of sight to the old *Australia II* mast, now forming the flagpole on the dais in front of the Clubhouse, where official photos were later taken.

Before dinner in the massive tent on the Club's grounds, each Team member was introduced to the seated dinner guests by name and by their role in 1983, as they walked across the stage acknowledging greetings and descended the steps at the end to take their own seats at marked tables.

This was a brilliant move since, apart from the usual spokespeople, the Team is often presented as an amorphous mass and most people have no idea who most of the members are (especially 40 years on!) or what role each might have played on or off the water.

According to John Longley, "it was both wonderful and gratifying to see each Team member welcomed and thanked equally enthusiastically and respectfully by the dinner guests."

A short Cup film followed to repaint the picture of the win and its aftermath 40 years later. It was also instructive for those who weren't involved in '83, couldn't remember much, or were too young at the time to appreciate its significance. Throughout dinner, entertainment was provided by pre-selected groups of Team members who took to seats onstage to tell behind-the-scenes stories and to explain and discuss important but lesser known or understood aspects of the 1983 challenge, the win and its aftermath to those who love sailing.

The format was designed to follow the old yachting

tradition of mates yarning informally with mates about yacht racing and associated matters.

"I had my doubts that this format, devised by relatively new GM, Rick Coate, would actually work but I was completely wrong. Everyone there loved it!" said John Longley.

A highlight of the dinner was the humorous address given by Minister Templeman, wearing his replica 'Bob Hawke jacket' with pride while also imitating the unmistakeable voice of the former Prime Minister, who had been present at RPYC in high spirits late on the night the Cup was won and who told Australians that any boss who sacked anyone for not turning up to work in the morning was "a bum"!

For many members of the Team and dinner guests, another highlight of the night was the rare and invaluable opportunity to catch up with old sailing friends and acquaintances, some of whom we'd not seen or spoken to since the 1980s.

"The format for the evening and its execution proved to be a fantastic way not only to retell the America's Cup story 40 years on, but also to enlighten those who knew little about it.

"Everything was done with grace, dignity and high regard for the history and importance of the Cup win – the pinnacle of Australian sporting achievement on the international stage – and with due respect and appreciation for all those who contributed to it.

"Special thanks to Commodore Dr Janet Hornbuckle, Flag Officers, members, management and staff – and everyone who attended -- for a magnificent evening the *Australia II* Team will never forget."

9 Lives' Wonderful Sail 2 Indonesia (S2I) Rally

After sailing 3,200 miles in 17 weeks since leaving Darwin in mid July 2023, '9 Lives' has reached the end of the Wonderful Sail 2 Indonesia (S2I) Rally. During this time we have met 50 boat crews from Europe, NZ, USA, Canada and developed a fantastic supportive community of like-minded yachties.

Indonesia has exceeded expectations as a cruising destination. The rally had 20 scheduled stops between the Mollucu (Spice) islands in the east and Batam, just off Singapore. Scheduled stops included a wide variety of cultural activities, dinners, wildlife and tours to local attractions. The Indonesian people have been incredibly welcoming and friendly wherever we have been and go to no end of effort to share their community with us including personalised invitations to their homes, giving gifts, having lots of laughs and even more photos and selfies.

The population is predominantly Muslim apart from Hindu Bali and some Christians in the Spice islands. It has been wonderful to come to understand their culture, customs, dress code and being woken by the mosque predawn. Deep down the people are the same. Although they don't drink alcohol and some islands are dry, many will provide you with a beer if you ask. Food varies from location to location and is very cheap at local warungs, as are other goods and services.

As to sailing in Indonesia, it has generally been on the

beam or downwind with very few jibes or tacks. As per the SE monsoon, the winds have been predominantly SE and only rarely above 15kts. Volcanoes and mountains often create significant wind shadows or draw the wind in. As the season nears the official end (October) and we get close the equator the winds have dropped with considerably more motoring. Nights are usually calm

 and around 23°C after days averaging 32°C. It's been very dry until late October when we got a few afternoon tropical thunder storms.

Each stop has been different and there are too many stories to tell but our favourite locations have been:

KAI ISLANDS

Our first stop and well off the tourist trail. The people were super friendly and welcoming. It was a mix of Muslim and Christian refugees kicked out of Banda by the Dutch. The beaches are pristine and coral colourful, though it will be a battle to keep it that way with the plastic.

WAKATOBI

Wakatobi Marine National Park is made up of four island groups and has some of the best snorkelling and diving of the trip. Not the calmest anchorage but the drift dives along the Hoga 30m drop off were fantastic. Tourists haven't returned yet after Covid.

KOMODO NATIONAL PARK

Located just off Labuan Bajo, at the west end of Flores. This town was the first tourist location we visited and the base for many Phinisi schooners, local timber boats which take tourists to the islands (in various states of comfort). A variety of great international restaurants made a welcome change to the nasi goreng diet.

Despite being dry, barren and virtually unpopulated, the islands were very scenic with good walks to viewing spots. As well as seeing the Komodo dragons on land, the islands were full of fantastic snorkelling locations including with the manta rays (up to 5 at a time) and fast drift dives with incredible coral variety.

BIMA

Set in a beautiful natural harbour on the north coast of Sumbawa. Whilst not a particularly attractive town, the welcome reception on the jetty with singing, dancing and

local treats was amazing. The rock star treatment continued on a day tour with 12 cars and police escort with sirens, lights and traffic light blocks. We were taken to traditional hill villages and the people were all adorned with their traditional woven fabrics. Also VIP treatment at the local TAFE where we spoke to hospitability students and saw them making batik fabrics.

BADAS

Badas was our second stop in Sumbawa at a tiny harbour where we rafted med style. One attraction here was the whale sharks, which were 2.5 hour drive and 1 hour local boat ride away. Getting up at 1.15am meant a long day but well worth it as the massive squid boats attract the whale sharks with krill and running water and you can swim with them as they linger in the area. Being circled by these magnificent animals is an amazing experience with one looking you in the eye and another coming up underneath you. A real western coffee shop on the way home was the icing on the cake for the day.

The other experience was buffalo racing, which is a big event in the local area. The locals provided our own opportunity to give buffalo racing a go – you stand on a slippery wooden frame between two buffalo that charge through the mud at crazy speed "steered" only by the whip. Mark stayed on the second try and fortunately only slightly bruised. A great experience not covered by travel insurance!

KUMAI

Kumai is a port town located 20 miles upstream on the muddy Kumai River in Kalimantan. Definitely the worst town we stayed in, not helped by dragging anchor in a thunder storm with a 2 knots current. The reason for going there was it's the gateway to the Tanjung National Park and where you change to a local Klotok boat, adapted to accommodate visitors on the Sekonyer (Crocodile) River. At the park, which is the biggest wild orangutan sanctuary in the world, we watched rehabilitated orangutans at three feeding stations and one even got onboard our tour boat. We also spotted Gibbons, Macagues and Probiscus monkeys, crocodiles, tarantulas and other critters and plants on night walks.

BELITUNG

Belitung has been dubbed the Virgin Islands of Indonesia but is not overrun with tourists (due to a lack of flights from Singapore since Covid). It has picture perfect white sandy beaches with granite boulders. The water is crystal clear, turtles swim, there's some good snorkelling and lots of islands and outcrops to explore. Sit back at a local waterside warung and enjoy crab, prawns, fish curry soup and a Bintang.

The S2I has been our first sailing rally and we've found it invaluable for having a large group of new friends and contacts. Along with a few of our own friends who joined us on 9 Lives, the company and camaraderie has been invaluable. Across the fleet everyone has experienced problems with engines, dragging anchors, equipment failure and lightning strike but there has always been at least one person in the group willing and able to help and most issues have been resolved quickly. Whilst there have been a few unexpected schedule changes, the local rally coordinator has been a wealth of information on local contacts and activity programs we would not have had by travelling alone.

Now we have crossed the equator and changed status from Pollywogs to "Shell Backs", we look forward to joining the Sail Malaysia Passage to Langkawi. A one month rally up the west coast, in the company of 30 boats mostly from the S2I. The journey continues.

Well done to Captain Sail Alan Thomas and Crew of *The Fox* for taking out two of the three Mini Series during the Stage and Studio Productions Wednesday Winter Series and also taking out first place for the overall Series in Division A. Alan had to work hard in fending off *Time Out* and *Déjà Vu* but, for his efforts now has another of the very sort-after rudder trophies to add to his growing collection.

GALACTIC CUP

The first weekend in November saw the return, for the third year of the BW8's annual windward-leeward regatta, the Galactic Cup. We had 13 of the 14 boats from RPYC and RFBYC compete in the regatta with some pretty strong breezes in the first session, giving rise to some exciting downwind legs. Returning to sailing in the fleet this season after a long break, Geoff Lansell in Prima8s seemed to revel in the 30 knot breezes and came away with wins in both the morning races. The wind moderated a little in the afternoon when another two races were programmed. In the first race of the session, Alan Thomas in *The Fox* showed the way to win that race, which also counted as the first heat of the BW8 State Championships. The second race of the afternoon got away to a good start, but unfortunately the Race Officer had to abandon the race, just as the first boat was approaching the finish, due to a massive wind shift - a sad end to the first day; but that's sailing. Day two saw some steadier winds and more great starts on a short line and tight racing for the three morning races. Once again Geoff Lansell took out the first two races but fell away in the third when he shredded the cover on the boat's spinnaker halvard. This let Duncan Cameron, on Privateer, slip over the line in first place. Geoff's great performances

with four wins and 9 points was just enough to take out the Galactic Cup, followed by Duncan Cameron (13 points) and defending trophy holder Chris Pye in *Pieces of Eight* third (15 points).

GOVERNORS CUP

Whist eleven entered, seven BW8s sailed in the Governors Cup starting in two groups a minute apart. The fleet stayed together, a bit like a cycling peloton, gradually hauling in the breakaway early starters, but also holding any later ones

In other good news the BW8 Association has taken delivery of its newly extruded mast sections and already has had interest from one yacht class to purchase five sections. This, together with the Association building its own spare masts, will mean that over half of the fourteen sections will have been taken up within a month of landing in Perth. This was a relatively common section in WA and was used on a number of classes such as the Farr 9.2. Anyone with an interest in the section should contact the BW8 Association.

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SUMMER 2023 // 2024

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DIVISION 2 REPORT



The commencement of the 23/24 season at our Club unfolded in splendid fashion, with an Opening Day blessed by what many are calling the best weather in recent memory. The sun graced us with unseasonable warmth. the winds were perfect for getting the crews into their stride and the boats were splendidly adorned for the traditional sail past. An enviable fleet of nineteen Division 2 boats, including the Farr 9.2s in their separate start, gathered to celebrate the season's kick-off.

A focal point of discussion among Division 2 enthusiasts revolves around the intricate world of handicaps. Balancing the performance of planing boats with asymmetric spinnakers against the sturdier displacement boats with symmetric spinnakers is no small feat. The agility of sports boats, particularly in light winds, is undeniable, and they can significantly outpace displacement boats when the breeze picks up. Excelling on reaches, they become unbeatable, yet face challenges when sailing

directly downwind due to their shallower angles and frequent gybes.

In response to the ongoing handicap debate, this season introduces a separate Sports Boat result within Division 2, relying on Australian Sailing's Class Boat Handicap (CBH). This fixed boat-based handicap remains constant throughout the season, providing a fairer platform for diverse boat types. Additionally, results based on the Australian Measurement System (AMS) will be recorded, offering a fixed boat handicap more tailored to displacement boats.

At the time of this writing, only three yachts within Division 2 had renewed their AMS subscription. As the season progresses, it is hoped that more sailors will contribute to the AMS results by obtaining or renewing their certificates. It's worth noting that certificates from previous years can be reactivated, provided there have been no modifications during that time. A wider participation in








the AMS category would add another layer of excitement and fair competition to Division 2 races.

It also seems timely to remind skippers about the signing on process within the Top Yacht portal. It has been two years since this system was introduced, and this season you need to be aware that there will be penalties for those forgetful skippers. Sailing Instruction 6.2 now reads:

It is the Skipper's responsibility to record themselves and all other persons on-board their boat. Boats that fail to Sign On via the Top Yacht App shall receive a 30% scoring penalty without a hearing for each breach. Maybe add a "SIGN ON" note to your course sheets so that you will get a final reminder before the start of the race.

In addition to the usual Saturday courses, Division 2 sailors are in for a treat before the Christmas break with the Windward Leeward Two Race Day, injecting a dose of intensity and fast paced boat handling into the sailing season.

The last race of 2023 is the Marathon Race, taking the fleet beyond the regular confines of Melville Water, past EFYC (East Fremantle Yacht Club). This elongated course promises an extended and exhilarating challenge for sailors, testing both their endurance and navigational acumen. ■

The Governor's Cup is Royal Perth Yacht Club's oldest perpetual trophy and has traditionally been presented to the winning skipper by the Governor of the day since 1904. In 1934 Freshwater **Bay Yacht Club Members** were invited to participate in the event and from that year onwards the cup legacy continues between the two Clubs, with the start and finish alternating location every year. One of the most memorable wins occurred in 1962 when Horace Rumble, after 43 years of attempts on his boat Mercedes, finally crossed the finish line in first. He also won again in 1968 and 1969. On Saturday 11th of November 2023, the Governor's Cup race was held with 65 starters at RPYC and the full course finishing at RFBYC. Over half a century after its last win Mercedes, led by skipper Kane Williamson, won again the trophy on a gusty and cloudy day. Alastair McMichael on Silver Fern was tenth overall and first of the S97's.







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OFFSHORE REPORT

OCEAN RACING NOTES

This season, the WA blue water fleet has sailed several offshore races in generally mixed conditions. The George Law, Westcoaster. Geraldton and Geraldton Return Race have all seen smaller fleets than usual. Some of the 'usual suspects' are away, and others are under repair. A SEASON OF MADNESS:

The Rolex Sydney to Hobart Yacht Race is considered a huge challenge on any ocean racer's calendar. It is hard, hard, hard, and every boat experiences issues, which require you to problem solve; Preparation is the key. This year for the first time in many years, your Club has two representatives in this event. Dennis Vincent and

Hilary Arthure's Sun Fast 3600 Wyuna, and Simon Torvaldsen's new Atomic Blonde, a JPK1180 are entered. Simon's boat is brand new out of the mould in Nowra (NSW), was delivered to Sydney in October and has been fitted out to Grand Prix standards. She is a delight to see and sail on (I was very lucky). We can expect to see a great performance from Atomic Blonde. For this race, Simon has elected to employ some professional crew. He also has a couple of Perth based crew on board Mike Foster and Steve Humphries.

Wyuna on the other hand has a different philosophy. Our goals are to start and finish the race, to push ourselves and the boat though any difficulties encountered, and to arrive in Hobart with friendships strengthened by the experience...and a few buckets kicked as well.

There is nothing easy about bringing a yacht to the east coast. You either sail there or truck it. I had fantastic advice from others who have already done this. We decided to truck over and sail back. Wayne Henderson's BoatCo is a giant of professionalism and knowledge.

In early October *Wyuna* left RPYC Annexe and was brought to FSC where her rigg was pulled by Rigging WA, her decks were stripped of all hardware, wheels were removed, winches and mast wrapped. She was loaded onto the flat bed truck. Before all that huge preparation had taken place. All sheets and



halyards were replaced, new Sails from Doyle, electronics ordered, motor serviced, and lots of spares purchased. That was just the start. So in the first week in October, I was the owner of a big trainer sailor!

After six days on the road, Wyung arrived at White Bay 6 Marine Park at Balmain. Under WA ownership but with an amazingly caring and skilled staff. we were made to feel at home. Wvung was unloaded and spent a week on the hard having a few repairs carried out and waiting for the crane driver so the riggers could do their work. It is very nerve wracking having to trust new riggers and shipwrights with this work, as we are a very close- knit group in WA and know each other well. However, I should not have worried, they were each beyond excellent. It was fun spending time in the boatyard watching people work on the TP52s there

(including *Zeus*, managed by Steve Thomas) and the rig of *Scallywag* (100- footer), which makes *Wyuna*'s mast look like a toothpick!

Departing WB6 a week later for our trip to the Cruising Yacht Club, Ian Ball and I felt exhilarated as we drove under the Harbour Bridge past *Commanche* and *Wild Oats X* who were out on a Wednesday afternoon sail! We arrived at CYCA to a warm welcome and a safe and secure floating pen for the next two months. The next couple of days were spent putting the boom and all the deck hardware back in place. Like making a jigsaw puzzle.

This whole exercise was a logistical nightmare. I had a few sleepless nights worrying about lining up all the trades and whether it would all work again. An enormous Excel spreadsheet and lists (lots

► of lists), govern my life these days. Plenty of planning and preparation certainly paid off. I feel so lucky and grateful to have had the support and encouragement of many amazing people. Firstly, my crew. We are a crew of seven, 4 from RPYC and 3 from FSC. This brought to the crew the correct balance of knowledge, previous experience, qualifications, and strength. On crew are Todd Giraudo, Ian Ball, Máire Connolly, John Rayner, Andrew Buchan and Antun Janekovich. I need to thank our Club for support and encouragement; our path has been smoothed by the Club on occasions. We have had Kingsley Piesse always available to offer wise counsel and practical help as well as others in the Offshore family. Anthony Kirke, Dave Davenport, Adam Shand and Billy Leonard, who have all travelled this road before and were full of excellent advice. Will Hammond made new sails for us and took us out training off Fremantle to experiment with a pole (now delivered) which will allow us to pole back our A-sails and sail deeper. The RSHYR is essentially an upwind/downwind race. I have often maintained that it takes a village to get Wyuna on water. The village has come up trumps.

We have to do an official qualifier of 150 NM in 24 hours (our Exmouth Race of 700 NM was 3 weeks too early- didn't count). On Friday 1st December we will be participating in the Cabbage Tree Island Race. The crew is flying in for this. This race will be an opportunity to run our systems and iron out any issues.

We will line up on Boxing Day with our bigger sister *Atomic Blonde*. Also making the trip south with some other WA sailors on other yachts. Kingsley Piesse is about to do his 40th race on *Chutzpah*; Mike Hughes is on *Maretimo*, Mark Lovelady on *Rockall 8* (the old *Atomic Blonde*) and Mark Williams (Normally a *Wyuna* crew in WA, but unable to make time commitment because of work) on *Avtros Flying Fish*.

Look out for our Commodore Janet and GM Rick, who have been invited as guests on the official vessels at CYCA. However, most of all to celebrate our Club and the total lunatic behaviour of two of our skippers (you must be mad to do this). Wish us luck on Boxing Day. If you are in Sydney, get in touch or come and say hello. The buzz on the docks in the days before the race is fantastic.



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
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
